WHY ARE THE LAKES SO LOW THIS SPRING?

We experienced lower than normal water level elevations on all lakes this spring. Due to the repair work on the Babcock and LaFollette Locks and Dams structures, we did not begin to raise the lakes as early this spring, as is our normal practice. We continue to experience lower than normal flow in the river system.

All lakes are within their respective permit levels. Pending normal precipitation, we should be able to remain above each lake's Summer Minimum.

As we enter in to the recreational boating season, our goal is to be at mid range for each lake. Mid range is 3 inches above Summer Minimum and 3 inches below the lake's Summer Maximum.

Work will continue on the Babcock and LaFollette Lock and Dam structures in late May. Phase 1, concrete repair and abutment modifications, is complete. Phase 2 is to replace logs in a few bays with new gate structures to allow for faster response to precipitation events and for more flexibility to manage water level elevations during low flow conditions. Safety improvements will be made to provide for continued public fishing access.

Due to continued work on both Babcock and LaFollette structures, fluctuating water levels may occur during the summer.

NEW PIER LEGISLATION - THE EFFECT ON LAKE PROPERTY OWNERS

On April 17, there were many changes to statutes affecting piers by Act 167. In a nutshell, the legislature repealed many of the restrictions placed on pier length. This is good news for each of us who owns a pier. But it also repealed those same restrictions applicable to our neighbors. So, its use and application will depend on whether riparians are installing piers and related structures or whether riparians are objecting to what other riparians are doing. Here are some of the key features of the new legislation.

- The "Grandfather" exemption for piers has been changed. Now, any pier placed before April 17 is grandfathered. Registration is not required.
- Can a pier be registered? Perhaps. Registration and filing with the Register of Deeds was an excellent way to forever preserve grandfathered pier rights.
- The current law that allows a pier to extend to "an adequate depth for mooring a boat or using a boat hoist" has not been changed.
- Riparians have assumed that the maximum 3-foot water depth governing pier length was measured at low water. That is no longer the case. Pier length is capped at the 3-foot water depth at summer low levels, which can be above the lowest water depth sometimes seen.
- Loading platform configuration has been changed. The old law allowed an 8-foot wide loading platform at the end of a pier, perpendicular to the main pier, thus creating a "T." There was no limit on the loading platform's length. A loading platform could theoretically run from lot lines extended into the lake the entire width of a riparian's property. Now loading platforms can be any shape as long as the surface doesn't exceed 200 square feet. The new legislation does not decide whether the pier deck immediately adjacent to the loading platform is counted as part of the 200 square feet.
- Riparians may now "secure" to a pier no more than two jet skis for the first 50 feet of frontage and one more for each additional 50 feet. This is in addition to the number of boat hoists a riparian is entitled to place. We don't know for sure what "secure" means.
- Public rights in lakes were not preserved, though are still guaranteed by the Public Trust Doctrine in the Wisconsin Constitution.
- The DNR must issue a general permit to place a pier in an area of Special Natural Resource Interest adjacent to a riparian owner's property. But the permit may impose restrictions.
- There is now an exemption to allow a riparian to remove some lakebed to place or maintain a pier or wharf, which includes boat lifts.

YAHARA LAKES ADVISORY GROUP 2 (YLAG2) UPDATE

YLAG2 is an advisory group convened by the Wisconsin DNR (WDNR) to advise the state on the operating rules for the Yahara Lakes. The WDNR held a public meeting on March 28th at the Alliant Center to review the YLAG2 draft recommendations and obtain public comments. Many YLA members attended the meeting to hear about the work of YLAG2 and to provide comments to the WDNR.

The WDNR has the authority to regulate lake level rules and river flow on the Yahara Lakes and River. YLAG2 was convened due to concerns about lake levels and how to manage the area lakes after the experience of recent floods in 2000, 2004, 2007 and 2008. The YLAG2 participants were from Wisconsin DNR, Dane County, area towns and cities, marinas and business groups, lake user groups, and UW-Madison. The Yahara Lakes Association, known for our advocacy for protecting the lakes and service to lakefront property owners, was invited to represent riparians on the YLAG2. The meetings were open to the public and public comments were presented at the meetings.

The group charge was to “examine the operation, physical constraints, and changing hydrology of the Yahara chain of lakes and make water level recommendations that balance public and private interests.” Public, private and cultural interests were also taken into consideration. Over the past year YLAG2 invited experts to speak to the group, help the group study the many issues affecting the lakes, and to identify areas of lake management where regulatory, management, fiscal, or other changes are needed to improve the lakes for the environment and lake users. Experts from the University, state and local government, private industry, user groups, helped the YLAG2 study the lakes’ fisheries, the watershed hydrology, the hydraulics of the Yahara River, the locks and dams on the chain of lakes, significant historic and archeological structures, public health, river flow modeling, economics, wetlands and many other issues related to our lakes.

YLAG2 provided the DNR with draft recommendations grouped into 6 different categories: water levels, watershed management, in-lake management, education and research, analyses and other.

In May and June, YLAG2 will meet again to review the public comments and input received over the past year. During April, the YLAG2 website was opened for interested citizens to submit electronic comments. NEW LEADERSHIP FOR MARINE AND TRAIL ENFORCEMENT BUREAU

Sergeant John Brogan is the new administrator for the Dane County Sheriff's Marine and Trail Enforcement Bureau (MTEB). The Sheriff's Office is rotating administrator positions and Sgt. Brogan takes over from Sgt. Dave Ritter, who is now with the Law Enforcement Training Center.

At the March YLA board meeting, Sgt. Brogan gave an update on MTEB. The patrol has 2 full time deputies and one sergeant, but during the summer several other deputies are brought in for boat patrol. MTEB has three boats, two of which are housed at the Tenney Park lock. One of the older boats, the 2006 Edgewater, is going to auction and bids are out for a replacement. The 2005 Boston Whaler was re-engineered and upgraded about 4-5 years ago, so will likely stay in the fleet. The summer staffing schedule begins May 19 from 10 am - 8pm or noon - 10pm depending on need and local events.



The DNR funds around 70% of MTEB through a reimbursement program. Under the current DNR rules, older boats are sold to offset the cost of replacement boats rather than donated to area park or fire departments as was done in the past.

If you see or are involved in an emergency on the lake call 911 since it might take time for the lake patrol to get to your location. To assist the lake patrol in locating an emergency on the lake, Sgt. Brogan encourages all lake property owners to obtain a pier number. *Note: See page 5 regarding pier numbers.*

The lake patrol also assists lake users in non-emergency situations. If you have a mechanical problem with your boat, you will be towed to the nearest landing. MTEB also responds to noise complaints. There is a higher frequency of complaints due to loud music, usually resolved by asking boaters to dial down their music, rather than loud boats. The YLA donated a noise meter which is used to measure dB levels of loud boats, but the boats are not easy to catch since MTEB is often in a different location.

Since MTEB wants everyone to be safe on the lakes, Sgt. Brogan strongly encourages all boaters to take a boater safety course. For information on times and locations of the classes, please go to www.danesheriff.com.

PIER AND LAKE PROPERTY NUMBERING SYSTEM

From Dane County Lakes and Watershed Commission

The Dane County Lakes and Watershed Commission and the Dane County Sheriff's Department, working with the Dane County Land Information Office and Dane County Public Safety Communications, have created a lake property numbering system to provide a more rapid response to emergencies and enhance the personal safety of everyone who uses the lakes. Any questions about this program should be directed to Sue Jones, Lakes and Watershed Commission staff at 224-3764.

How it works:

- Each lakeshore property has been assigned a number that is cross-referenced in the 911 computer with the property's street address.
- Lakeshore owners are being asked to voluntarily post their lake addresses on a sign at the end of their piers.
- A boater in distress can report his or her location by cell phone using the nearest pier "address" as a reference point.
- A landowner who observes an emergency on the water can dial 911 and the dispatcher will be able to translate the street address to a water location.



How you can participate:

- Go to the location where signs are being sold for your community.
- Buy the sign and set of numbers at a cost of \$10. Checks should be made out to the Dane County Lakes and Watershed Commission.
- Attach the sign to your pier where it can be easily seen from the water.

COW POWER II

Dane County is moving forward with plans for a second cow power facility, selecting a site for the project, and entering into a new partnership for the project with major healthcare provider, Gundersen Health System, Dane County Executive Joe Parisi announced in April. Construction of the manure digester is anticipated to begin in late 2012.

Dane County and Gundersen Health System plan to join with three farm families in the Town of Springfield, just outside of the city of Middleton – the Ziegler Dairy Farm, Blue Star Dairy, owned by the Meinholz Family, and the Hensen Brothers Farm. US BioGas will also join the partnership as project developer. Madison Gas and Electric will purchase the 11,000,000 kilowatt hours of electricity annually from the Springfield facility, enough to power approximately 1,600 homes.

The construction of a second digester realizes a goal in the County Executive's previously announced five-year plan to help clean up county lakes – the Dane County Water Partnership – and builds on the county's strong relationship with farm families to reduce phosphorus runoff in target areas throughout the Yahara Lakes Watershed. Phosphorus is the leading cause of green algae and other weed growth in Dane County's lakes and comes from both urban and rural sources.

Agreements for the community manure digester project will move forward pending approval by the Dane County Board. In addition to County Board approval, the project will also need approval from the Town of Springfield and air and water permits from the state Department of Natural Resources.

Dane County's first cow power manure digester has been receiving the manure from 2,500 cows of three family farms in the Town of Vienna since construction was completed in March of 2011. The facility is generating electricity purchased by Alliant Energy to power approximately 2,000 homes and has removed about 60,000 pounds of phosphorus from the Yahara Lakes watershed.

SHORELINE OF GOVERNOR'S EXECUTIVE RESIDENCE TO GET A MAKEOVER

A citizen group that participated in the Wisconsin Lake Leaders Institute has gotten the green light to restore the shoreline at the Governor's Executive Residence in Madison to boost wildlife habitat and water quality.

Shoreland restorations use native flowers, grasses, shrubs and trees to provide erosion control, filter runoff before it enters water, provide wildlife habitat and scenic beauty. The plant design for the residence was prepared by Hope Oostdik of Dutch Designs; Lisa Reas of LJ Reas Environmental Consulting Corp.; Bradley Vowels, a graduate student at the UW-Madison; and Barb Gajewski a 2008 Lake Leader graduate and environmental consultant. The planting will occur in September 2012.



The group is now seeking materials and donations for the project as well as recruiting people to serve on a variety of committees to raise money for the project, get it done and maintain it. There are many ways to be part of this project to make the Executive Residence a great example of how we can help protect the lakes that mean so much for our quality of life, our outdoor recreation and our local economies. 

- Ray Potempa serves on the board of FOLKS (Friends of Lake Kegonsa Society) and is our link to events and concerns from the southernmost Yahara lake.
- YLA supports Clean Lakes Alliance's efforts to reduce phosphorus by 50% in the Yahara watershed. As part of that effort, YLA was one of the major sponsors of the CLA Lake Summit held on April 21st. In addition, CLA and YLA both benefit from sharing members on their respective boards.
- For many years, Bill von Rutenberg has generously supported a fundraiser at the Nau-Ti-Gal for the Dane County Sheriff's Marine and Trail Enforcement Bureau. The money raised is given to the Lake Patrol, which keeps everyone safe on the lakes. (Read more about the Lake Patrol on page 4 of this issue.)
- The Dane County Executive has asked representatives from the county, city, business, lake organizations and user groups to attend monthly lake meetings on efforts being made to clean up the area lakes - another way for YLA to stay informed and involved. Sal Troia, Dick Pearson and Carol Gillen were the YLA representatives at the April meeting and Carol attended the May meeting. MMSD presented their water adaptive management plan for phosphorus reduction at the first meeting and the second county manure digester was reviewed at the recent meeting. TOP 10 THINGS TO KEEP ONLY RAIN GOING INTO OUR LAKES

You probably will not hear this top 10 list on the David Letterman Show but the items are still worth a read.

- Keep leaves and grass clippings out of the street.
- Direct rainwater away from paved areas with a rain barrel, rain garden or aiming downspouts to grassy areas.
- If you apply pesticides and herbicides, follow the product label directions. Consider natural alternatives to the chemicals.
- Test soil to determine if you need fertilizer.
- Pick up after your pets and flush or bury waste 6 inches deep.
- Take used oil to a recycling collection site.
- Keep your car maintained to avoid leaks and properly dispose of old batteries.
- If you wash your own car or boat, use your lawn or go to a car wash that sends used water to the sewage treatment plant.
- Prevent soil erosion by seeding/mulching as quickly as possible or covering the soil with a tarp until you are ready to use it.
- Become involved and learn more about the lakes and streams by joining a local watershed, lake or conversation group.

CURRENTS

- **Dane County, the Town of Dunn and the Natural Heritage Land Trust** have entered a new partnership to protect a 40-acre property on the south shore of Lake Waubesa. The property overlooks the lake and has around 1,400 feet of shoreline. The purchase of the area will allow public access, help improve water quality, and protect the Waubesa wetlands, which has variety of aquatic plants, rare birds and the Blanding's turtle.
